NPM Step 4: Get Involved

Community leaders agree that homeland security requires volunteers, a trained and informed public and increased support of emergency response agencies during disasters. Major disasters can overwhelm first-responder agencies, encouraging individuals to lend support. In order to give support effectively when needed, citizens should register to participate in America's PrepareAthon, participate in a posted readiness event, or sponsor an event.

Get Involved before disaster strikes! Here are a few more ways you can help:

- Volunteer with a non-profit organization and be trained before the next event to find meaningful volunteer opportunities following a disaster in your community.
- Affiliate with existing non-profit organizations before coming to the disaster area.
- Be part of the community planning process. Connect and collaborate with your local emergency planning group, Citizen Corps Council or local emergency management agency.

- Find an event or identify local resources, build a team, choose a project, set goals and serve your community by improving the preparedness of your friends, colleagues and neighbors.
- Support relief efforts by donating cash or goods that may help meet the needs of your community in times of disaster.

This represents only a few of the many ways that individuals and community organizations can Get Involved to help communities prepare for, respond to and recover from disasters.
